Inspired by the factory tour segments from Mister Rogers' Neighborhood television series, this exhibit offers hands-on activities using real factory tools and machines to create objects with four manufacturing processes - molding, cutting, deforming and assembly. When you visit with your families, we have some tips that will make your experience even more enjoyable.

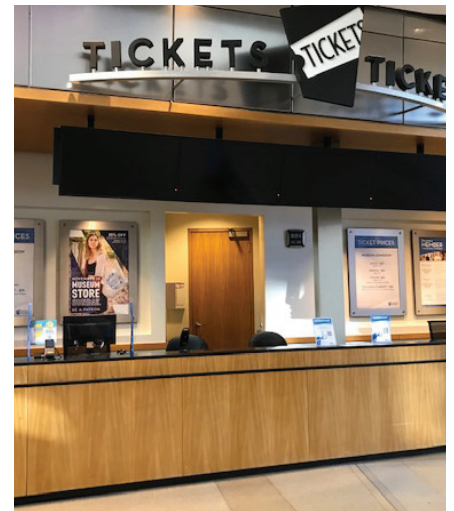
LEVEL 1:

Please Note

- Overhead music will be playing in Great Hall upon your arrival.
- If you're searching for a quiet time to visit, late afternoons Wednesday through Sunday from 3-5pm is a good time to come.
- Bathrooms are located behind the ticket counter and by the grand staircase.
- How People Make Things is on the 3rd floor and can be accessed by elevator or stairs.

Museum Ticket Counter

- Stop by the ticket counter to get your museum admission wristbands. Adults can hold on to children's wristbands if they don't want to wear them.



LEVEL 2:

Please Note

- A Quiet room/Mom's room is located on the 2nd floor outside the 2nd floor gallery exit; ask a staff in a blue shirt for assistance.
- Bathrooms are located nearby the Tea Room.

LEVEL 3:

Please Note

- Overhead music will also be heard on the third-floor bridges.
- Bathrooms, as well as a family restroom, are available.
- How People Make Things is located through Rapp Hall in the NiSource Gallery.

How People Make Things Exhibit

This exhibit is filled with sensory and hands-on activities for the whole family to enjoy. There are on-going videos with sounds throughout the exhibit.

- Flatten a penny through a sequence of three presses. Observe the new patterns and texture created by each press. If a penny gets stuck in a press, ask a staff in a blue shirt for assistance.
- Use fine motor skills to bend a twist tie into a spring.
- Match an object, like a ball, to the industrial mold from which it was made by examining texture, size and shapes.
- Cut a pattern of a horse or a box and then assemble it to take home.
- Use sculpting tools to scrap and cut a block of wax.
- Assemble different parts of a trolley and then test it on the track. When you're done take the trolley apart and sort the pieces back into the bins.
- Use different materials like wood, plastic and metal to build a structure through open-ended play.
- Dress up like a factory worker for some pretend play.
